COMPLEX

Cause and effect coherent in retrospect do not repeat Pattern Management Perspective Filters Complex Adaptive Systems Probe-Sense-Respond

CHAOS

No cause and effect relationships perceivable Stability focused intervention ENACTMENT TOOLS Crisis Management Act-Sense-Respond

COMPLICATED

Cause and effect separated over time and space Analytical/Reductionist Scenario PLANNING Systems Thinking Sense-Analyse-Respond

SIMPLE

Cause and effect relations repeatable and predictable Legitimate best practice STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURES Process Re-Engineering Sense-Categorise-Respond

THE IMPLICATIONS OF COMPLEXITY

- Small differences at the start create big differences by the end ... so different cultures require different processes
- In retrospect, we can see how, where, when and why things happened ... *but prediction is impossible*

ANTHROPOLOGY

- Narrative is not story but fragments
- How we define in social groups:
 - Who's in and who's out
 - What we aspire to
 - What we will tolerate and what we won't
- Homo narrans the storytelling ape



SO WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

- Understanding the population = need to understand their narratives
- Use patterns to see fixed and movable points in belief systems
 - Emergent patterns, not predicted ones
- Facts don't beat narratives
- No hard and fast way to adapt things
 - Probe, Sense, Respond

The science behind narrative research

- Human beings pick up partial information and fit them into preexisting patterns and narratives
 - Information is filtered by the patterns in our brains
 - Patterns stem from our direct experience and the stories we hear around us
- Minimal hypothesis
- Expert interpretation is good place to start, but there are significant pitfalls
- Meaning is not in the content

"Red shirt" is an assessment of life expectancy, not a statement about fashion



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NARRATIVES

- The Grand Narrative
 - The overarching structure, based on direction and constraint
 - If over-defined, it risks being too idealistic
 - For top-down direction, not for analysis the Danger of a Single Story: http://on.ted.com/3k

NARRATIVES

- The Grand Narrative
- The local narratives
 - The individual communication coherent with the Narrative
 - Based on experience/knowledge and relevant to the local context
 - Best made up from examples in the micro-narrative environment

ADVICE

- Use examples to illustrate abstract concepts
 - Situations that will resonate
 - Recall moments of their history that have parallels (but check with someone from the culture beforehand)
- To set strategy and direction, use "more stories like these, fewer like those"
- The heroes and protagonists in the examples should be the audience
 - NATO is not a hero riding to the rescue, it is more often an ally or mentor
